WELCOME TO ASPEN MOUNTAIN

THERE IS NO DENYING THE UNIQUE PERSONALITY OF ASPEN MOUNTAIN. Rising from the vibrant heart of downtown Aspen, this is where it all began in 1946 with the single-seat Lift 1, which immediately became the longest chairlift in the world. Nearly 70 years later, the charm and history of Aspen continues to be the foundation of the mountain they still call "Ajax". Today, skiers ascend the summit via the Silver Queen Gondola. Up top, they can enjoy the stellar views and delicious cuisine at the Sundeck, float through the infamous powdery glades on the Face of Bell, or cruise down the same runs that have hosted World Cup races for decades. Despite the skiing pedigree and prestige of Aspen Mountain, it is a local's mountain with little fuss and an easygoing vibe. Say "après ski" and most people picture something strikingly similar to Ajax Tavern – glamorous yet easy. This sun-drenched, mountainside patio is the idyllic place for lunch, après ski and dinner.

Ski & Snowboard Schools: Private lessons at Aspen Mountain cater to intermediate to expert level skiers and riders. Group lessons are offered for adult intermediate to expert skiers. No one knows the terrain better than our Pros and we look forward to sharing our favorites. We make better skiers and riders, guaranteed!

First Tracks: Join our staff for the first run of the day on newly groomed snow or fresh powder. Offered daily beginning December 12. Space is limited. Advance reservations (within 24 hours) and valid lift ticket/season pass required. Sign up in the gondola building or by calling 970-920-0755.

Powder Tours: Luxury snowcats take you to prime untracked stashes on the backside of Aspen Mountain. Fresh tracks guaranteed and gourmet lunch included. Sign up in the gondola building or by calling 970-920-0720.

Snowshoeing: December 14, 2015 - April 15, 2016, twohour guided tours with a naturalist from the Aspen Center for Environmental Studies depart from the top of the Silver Queen Gondola at 10 am and 1 pm daily. WELCOME TO ASPEN HIGHLANDS



Beyond these two iconic spots, guests enjoy gorgeous groomers, challenging steeps and a one-and-only view of Maroon Bells and Pyramid Peak together.

Highland Bowl Snowcat: Catch a FREE ride to the spectacular Highland Bowl hiking trail. The snowcat operates daily from 10:30 am to 2:30 pm, weather and conditions permitting. For more information, check the information board at the top of Loge Peak lift.

Stunning Views & On-Mountain Dinners: Stop for lunch or take a snowcat ride to dinner at Cloud Nine Alpine Bistro and enjoy gourmet meals with a European flair. Also take a look at the beautiful Highland Bowl and beyond from the Patrol Headquarters at Loge Peak.

Uphill Traffic: Uphillers must be past the Merry-Go-Round restaurant by 9 am in order to proceed to the upper mountain. Keep to the sides of all trails and avoid blind spots. Uphill traffic is only permitted on designated and marked trails. Uphill traffic will not be permitted during avalanche control.





Observe the code listed below and share with other skiers and riders the responsibility for a great skiing and riding experience.

1. Always stay in control. 2. People ahead of you have the right of way. 3. Stop in a safe place for you and others. 4. Whenever starting downhill or merging, look uphill and yield. 5. Use devices to help prevent runaway equipment. 6. Observe signs and warnings, and keep off closed trails. 7. Know how to use the lifts safely.

Be safety conscious and KNOW THE CODE. IT'S YOUR RESPONSIBILITY. This is a partial list. Officially endorsed by: NATIONAL SKI AREAS ASSOCIATION.

- SKI PATROL: Please do not hesitate to ask ski patrol for help or information. Emergency phone umbers are listed in the legend for each individual mountain. Report all accidents to ski patrol mediately. Ski patrol closes the trails whenever it is deemed necessary. Respect all closed trail signs. Skiers/snowboarders shall not enter a trail that is closed. All skiers/snowboarders involved in a collision must leave their names and addresses with ski patrol.
- Know your ability level and ski/ride within it.
- Natural and man-made objects exist and may not be marked.
- Mountain operations continue during the day including snowmaking, grooming activities and the use of snowmobiles on the ski area.
- It is a violation of CO law to leave the scene of an accident if you are involved in a collision.
- HELMETS: We strongly recommend helmet usage for all skiers and snowboarders, regardless of

TERRAIN PARK USERS' GUIDE STYLE

1. Make a plan: Every time you use freestyle terrain, make a plan for each feature you want to use. Your speed, approach and take off will directly affect your maneuver and landing. FREESTYLE TERRAIN 2. Look before you leap: Scope around the jumps first, not over them. Know landings are [᠉]SPT දි¦ි clear, and clear yourself out of the landing area.

PARKS 3. Easy style it: Start small and work your way up.

4. **Respect gets respect:** From the liftline through the park. Jibbing is for the designated parks and appropriate features. Please respect our property and facilities.

TREE-WELL AND DEEP-SNOW SAFETY: If you decide to leave the groomed trails, you are voluntarily accepting the risk of a deep-snow immersion accident. A deep-snow or tree-well immersion accident occurs when a skier or rider falls into an area of deep unconsolidated snow and becomes immobilized and suffocates. Deaths resulting from these kinds of accidents are referred to as a NARSID or Non-Avalanche Related Snow Immersion Death. Visit treewelldeepsnowsafety.com and become educated on how to reduce risk through your own action and awareness.

BACKCOUNTRY: Backcountry travel can be extremely dangerous and can result in serious injury or death. There is no ski patrol, avalanche control or other Ski Area Services beyond the ski area boundaries. Access to public lands beyond the ski area boundary may be made through U.S. Forest Service access points. Rescue in the backcountry is under the jurisdiction of the Pitkin County Sheriff's Office. Backcountry rescues, if available and possible, are difficult and expensive
